Her academic journey reflects a strong foundation in both technical and humanistic disciplines.

Marina holds a degree in Architecture and Urban Planning from São Paulo State University, complemented by training at ENSA Paris-La Villette (2007). She earned a Master of Arts in Conservation and Enhancement of Historical and Cultural Heritage through a joint program between the University Paris 1 Panthéon-Sorbonne, the University of Évora, and the University of Padua (2010). She later completed a joint Ph.D. in Art History at Ca' Foscari and IUAV Universities of Venice, and in History (specializing in Politics, Memory, and Cities) at the State University of Campinas (2015).

Throughout her career, Marina has worked as an architect specializing in the restoration of historical buildings and taught expography and museography. She managed art collections, and coordinated and designed exhibitions for museums and cultural institutions around the world. She currently serves as Exhibition and Collections Registrar at Photo Elysée in Switzerland, while also contributing as a guest lecturer at Ca' Foscari University in Venice.

In parallel, she independently curates exhibitions and conducts research at the intersection of art and architectural history, with a particular focus on the Venice Biennale Marina is actively engaged in academic and professional networks. She has played key roles in initiatives promoting higher education programs such as the Erasmus+, in close collaboration with the European Commission. During 2023-2025, she has been a board member of ICAMT where she has been an active contributor since 2018. Since 2019, she has been a member of the Scientific Board of ICOM-ICAMT. She has projected exhibition design in International Museum and Foundations like Fundação Gouldbenkian (Portugal), MIT-Boston (USA), Politecnico di Milano (Italy), Fundação Iberè Camargo (Brasil), MASP Sao Paulo (Brasil)and curated several international exhibitions, including Disegnare nelle Città (2004), Ereditare il Paesaggio (2007), De Chirico e il sentimento dell'architettura (2011), Il Paesaggio dei Diritti (2017 – awarded the Italian Presidential Medal), and Il Resto dell'Alba (2023). It has been a great honor to host the 2024 annual conference in Taiwan, with the National Museum of Prehistory, where I work, serving as the host organization.

Short Bio

I am a Taiwanese anthropologist currently serving as an Associate Curatorial Researcher and Head of the Department of Exhibition and Education at the National Museum of Prehistory in Taiwan. I am also an Adjunct Associate Professor at National Taitung University, where I teach museology and cultural heritage. I am recognized for my expertise in Taiwanese Indigenous communities, textiles, and the relationship between museums and Indigenous peoples. Over the past two decades, I have conducted extensive research on Austronesian-speaking populations across Taiwan, Indonesia, and Fiji.

Since 2017, I have been actively involved in Indigenous museum development and training initiatives in Taiwan. My work emphasizes cross-cultural and comparative perspectives on museology and cultural diversity. I have published widely on ritual practices, religious conversion, and emerging movements of cultural revitalization among Taiwan's Indigenous Bunun people. Additionally, I have edited two volumes on Taiwanese Indigenous Atayal weaving, contributing significantly to the preservation and reinterpretation of Indigenous textile traditions.

As the Chief Curator, I have led several important exhibitions, including: "First Wave: Contemporary Australian and Taiwanese Indigenous Fashion Exhibition" (2022, in collaboration with Bendigo Art Gallery, Melbourne, Australia), "Austronesian Hall – Long-term Exhibition" (2023, National Museum of Prehistory, Taiwan), "Contested Frames: Taiwan's Indigenous Peoples Confronting the Colonial Gaze" (2025, in collaboration with Temple Anthropology Laboratory and Museum, USA). I am also a translator for several key publications, including: Pacific Histories: Oceans, Land, People (2020), Pathway of the Birds: The Voyaging Achievements of Māori and Their Polynesian Ancestors (2024) and Sweat and Salt Water: Selected Works (2025).

Through these experiences, I have come to understand that being an ICAMT board member is a responsibility that requires significant dedication and time. It has been both inspiring and educational, providing opportunities for collaboration and learning through conversations with colleagues at conferences, online panel discussions, and emerging working groups.

As a curator and researcher, my focus has been on how space, narrative, and objects collectively shape the audience's experience and understanding of exhibitions. With over two decades in the museum field, I have come to deeply value the connection between space and human interaction with that space. This relationship not only evokes visual and emotional responses, but also fosters a sense of belonging and attachment. 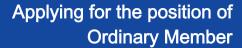

Specialist in architectural preservation of historic buildings. Worked for Institute of National Historical and Artistic Heritage / IPHAN in the period 1983-2008. Expert in architecture of museums adapted in historic buildings. Worked for Brazilian Institute of Museums / IBRAM in the period 2009-2014. Director of the architecture and urbanism sector at OIKOS Architecture and Environmental Engineering since 2015. Has been working in research and development with a focus on environmental sustainability and energy efficiency aiming the interventions in existing buildings of adaptive reuse for museums. Participated in several historic buildings preservation works, such as the Old Customs House to installation of Casa França-Brasil Cultural Center; Itamaraty Palace for the reinstallation of Diplomatic Historical Museum in Rio de Janeiro; Gustavo Capanema Palace, the modernist architecture for the Ministry of Education and Health of Brazil, the National Historical Museum / IBRAM and others. Participated in the implementation and development of Museum Architecture Workshops in several cities in Brazil: Received the Distinction of the Rio Branco Order in the Knight Degree for relevant services rendered during the restoration work of the Itamaraty Palace in Rio de Janeiro, medal granted in 1989 by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Brazil. Received the 1st Prize in the Casamo-Clim International Competition with a team project in bioclimatic architecture in 1992, awarded by ADEME - Agence de l'Environnement et de la Maîtrise de l'Énergie in Paris/France.

The necessary architectural interventions to achieve net zero energy museum buildings, the changes in the paradigms of listed architecture, the urban heat islands and the impact on the preventive conservation of collections, the presentation of specific museum solutions, are other examples. Of course any other topic that is considered important by the ICAMT community as a whole, the Board and members, should be considered. It could also bring up issues currently being addressed by other ICOM committees. I envision a dynamic meeting structure, free of charge because it would not involve travel or registration fees, open to ICAMT members. The presentations and discussions time would last about an hour, divided into stages and days, if necessary. I think it would probably be two topics per year, one in each semester. The reason I would like to join the ICAMT Board is to streamline the circulation of knowledge through open case studies, different from workshops and conferences. The goal is, using an online meeting platform, to stimulate the reflection of new and different ideas in the field of architecture and museum techniques, quickly and nimbly.

As a Brazilian architect and urban planner, my interest is in the building and its internal aspects as well as its external relationships with landscapes. My focus is on the historic buildings, pre-existing architectures in the cities, and its adaptive reuse for museums. This set constitutes the majority of architectural complexes housing museum institutions in Brazil. The complexity and sustainability of intervening in ancient architecture has led me to the hot and humid climate aspects and the potential of environmental solutions inside and outside the museum buildings heritage. Thus, bioclimatic architecture with passive methods of comfort and environmental control became my main topic of research, involving the environmental sustainability of old museum buildings flows to energy efficiency, and the use of renewable energy leading to Zero-Energy buildings.

Yasaman Esmaili is an architect, educator, and founder of Studio Chahar (2018-present), a design-research practice focused on cultural equity, ecological resilience, museum design, and community-led processes. She holds a B.Arch from the University of Tehran (2008), an M.Arch from the University of Arizona (2011), and an M.S. in Design Computing from the University of Washington (2015). In addition to Studio Chahar, she cofounded Color My Home, a project exploring the meaning of home and immigration through architectural thinking.

Before these initiatives, her professional experience included roles at AE Mimarlik, Hewitt Architects, and Blokable (Seattle). Her museological work examines how cultural and civic institutions operate as infrastructures for learning and participation. She has led museumdesign, community-based heritage, and landscape initiatives that connect craft, place, environmental stewardship, and interpretation, and has shared this approach at ICAMT conferences (2021, 2024) and through exhibitions such as the 5th Chicago Architecture Biennial (2023-24), the 15th Venice Architecture Biennale (2016), the Smithsonian's Design with the 90% exhibition (2018), and Niavaran Cultural center (2025). Esmaili's recognitions include the Digital Futures Critical Practice Award (2024), the University of Washington Graduate of the Last Decade (GOLD) Award (2023), and the Tamayouz Women in Architecture Rising Star Award (2020). 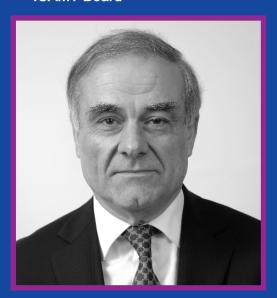
